YOSHIO KURAHASHI is one of Japan's great masters of the shakuhachi, the end-blown bamboo flute. He first took up a shakuhachi at the age of 10, playing an old one his father gave to him as a 'practice' flute (he still plays it). Under his father, he studied the Zen Buddhist honkyoku (solo meditation pieces) that originated in the temples of Japan as long ago as 700 years. Later he studied the classical sankyoko ensemble music (for shakuhachi, koto and shamisen) of the Edo and Meiji periods (1603-1912). His father was the first director of the Muju-An Shakuhachi School in Kyoto; in 1980, Yoshio became the second. Since then, he has taught and performed throughout Asia, Europe, Israel and the United States. A champion of contemporary music for the shakuhachi, Kurahashi has premiered works by Tetsunosuke Kushida and Hifumi Shimoyama, the Israeli composer Meir Mindel and the American Randall Snyder.
